# PASTOR'S Perspective

## A God for All Seasons



The past two Sundays I drove my children off to school. First it was Karyn, who is a senior at Mount Pisgah Academy. We left at 6:30 a.m. and managed to get to the school by 9:00 a.m. in time for registration. After figuring out class schedules and receiving her work assignment it was off to the dormitory where we spent the next 1½-2 hours cleaning and rearranging her room. After lunch we drove to the school uniform store where we spent another hour choosing polo shirts and skirts. Then after a final prayer and good-byes Robin and I drove off leaving our youngest child behind.

This past Sunday I did it all over again, this time driving Eric to Southern Adventist University for his sophomore year. Once again we unloaded all his gear into his dorm room with the help of friendly volunteers and Southern staff. He then walked over to the administration building where he arranged for payment of his bill. The actual registration for classes had been done months earlier online. In many respects this trip, though longer, was much easier. I then prayed with our son, gave him a hug and headed the six hours home. Once again I was very tired by the time I reached my bed that night.

It seems only yesterday that Eric, and later Karyn, began their first day in church school. The years have sped by and now they are gone. While I miss having them around at home I am comforted by the fact that they are both ready to take the next step in their educational journey with God. They need the wisdom, guidance and Christian role modeling that dedicated Seventh-day Adventist teachers can give. They need the time and opportunity to become the young man and young woman that God wants them to be.

As the wise man Solomon once said, "To everything there is a season, a time for every purpose under heaven." (Ecclesiastes 3:1) As I look at my children and then myself in the mirror I realize that the years have passed rather quickly. Yet the comforting thing for me is to realize that God has been with me and my family each step of the way. He promises, "I will never leave you nor forsake you." So we may boldly say: "The Lord is my helper; I will not fear. What can man do to me?" (Hebrews 13:5,6)

Whether you are single and are still trying to figure out your future, or married and expecting your first child. 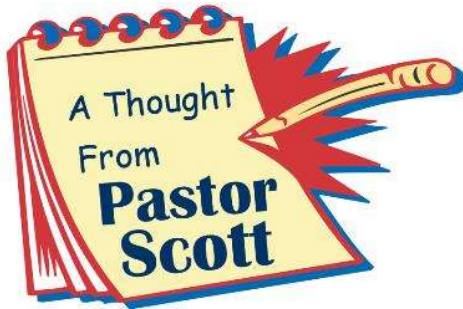

How many times have you heard someone in the church say that they were not worthy of their Salvation? How many people who call themselves Christians tell others that they are worthless, and that in spite of that fact, they have been rescued by Jesus? Many believe that it is good to describe themselves with the understanding that they are all sinners and that on their own merits they deserve nothing but death. However, there is a problem with this mindset because that no longer describes our situation in Christ



You have heard that “beauty is in the eyes of the beholder” and “one man’s trash is another man’s treasure.” That’s why we have to pass so many yard sales on Sabbath morning as we head to church. As you probably know, there are two types of values: intrinsic and extrinsic. Intrinsic value is when the item is valuable from what it is. There is nothing that needs to add weight to it to make it valuable. Gold is a good example of this because to its core, gold has value. The exact amount of value may vary between those who want it and those who want the money they have invested in it. A good test for intrinsic value is to take an item to a recycle company and see if they give you money for an item. Gold will put money in your pocket from a recycle company.

Our paper money is a good example of extrinsic value. The material used to make a twenty dollar bill is maybe a few pennies, and yet a twenty dollar bill is worth twenty dollars because of the extrinsic value that has been placed on the twenty by those who accept it. There is almost no intrinsic value, but you can go to Wal-Mart and come home with some food or other items because of its value.

People who have accepted Jesus as their Savior have extrinsic value because Jesus decided to die for them so that He could save them. You take people to a recycle company—well you get the idea. What I do is not related to my value, but instead my value comes from what Jesus has been for me. Most in the universe would not pay very much for me, but Jesus paid it all. Therefore I am valuable, as are you. And dare I say that we deserve heaven, not on our own merits, but on the merits of the one who paid the price.

So the next time that you think that you are worthless, remember what Jesus has done and tell Satan to talk with your attorney.

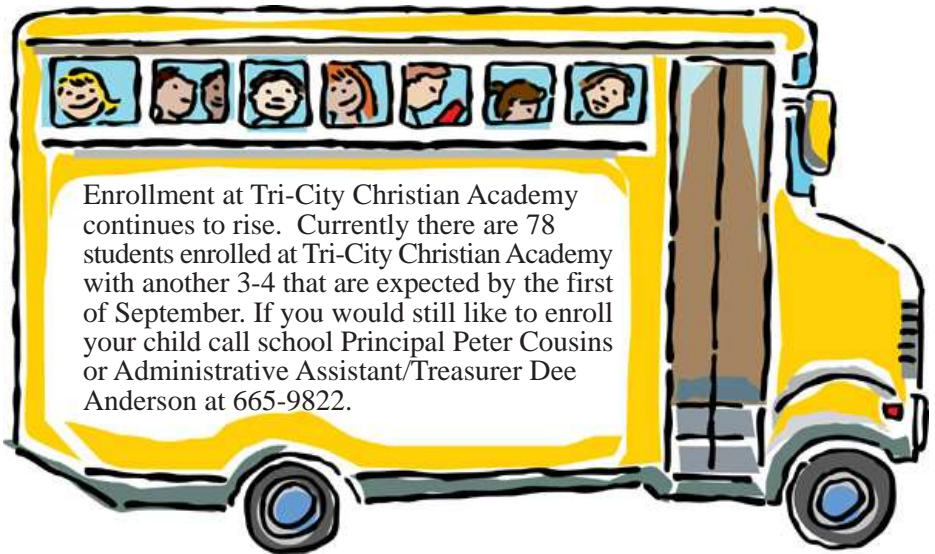

with the graduate degree aspires to be a tenured professor and teach college like his father.

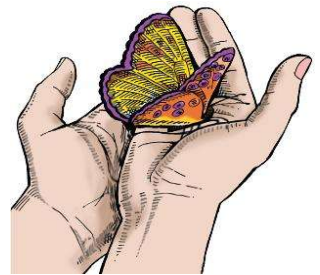

## Sharing a Blessing by Jim Wilburn



God is so good! I look back over the years and see how God has led in so many ways. Let me share one with you. Back in 1959 I was working for Elmore's Office Supply in Knoxville, TN. I was working a lot of over time and didn't take the time to go and get any preventative measures against Polio. That year Polio was very much on the rampage and, as many times, we think we don't have the time or that the illness won't affect us.

My father and Margaret had gotten all their series of sugar cubes with the medicine on them. My mother had not had hers as well.

Margaret and I had only been married less than a year when I became ill with flu-like symptoms. After several days I wasn't getting any better so the doctor sent me to the hospital and there I was diagnosed with Bulbar Polio (which is considered the killer type) and very few live with this. I was only given a 50% chance to make it through the next 5 days.

I was put in isolation and only Margaret and my dad were to visit me. At this time I was running a very high fever and the nurses were bathing me with alcohol and cold water to bring down my fever. It was very hard for my mother not to be able to come in to see her only child. I was paralyzed in my throat and could not even swallow my own saliva or drink or eat. I was also paralyzed in my right shoulder and leg.

Our pastor at the Knoxville Church was Lester O. Coon and he along with Margaret and my dad anointed me and over a period of time I became better. It was a gradual healing because God wanted us to experience His love and mercy.

It was very hard for me as I began to recover and wanted so much to be able to play my trombone. I will never forget the first time I tried to play the trombone and my lips were not strong enough to make a sound. I cried for the fear that I would never be able to play again. I had played in the school band since I was in elementary school and through high school and was in the marching band at Southern College.

But only with the help of God my lips became stronger and the healing has been so that I can glorify Him with the music of praise. To God be the glory!
